For What?

Background

Women play key roles in agricultural and rural development. However, due to their limited access to agricultural resources and opportunities such as land, water, extension services and business related knowledge, many women are not able to demonstrate their capability to realize full production potential. Women also take responsibilities for much of the unpaid care and domestic work, such as household chores and child rearing which makes their work hours much longer than men. Social and cultural constraints and gender-based discrimination also make it difficult for women to advance their potential. This program is designed to provide useful methods and practical skills to empower rural women reflecting good practices of Japan.

Objective

Participants acquire knowledge on Life Improvement Approach and empowerment of rural women from good practices of Japan.

To Whom?

Job Areas and Organizations

This program is designed for central and local government agencies, or Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) which implement extension (agriculture, home economics, income generation, or community development), gender, and social welfare activities targeting rural women.

Course Capacity: 15 participants

The applying organization with the best intention to utilize the opportunity of this program will be highly valued in the selection.




Program in Japan (Face to Face):

Program Structure

[Outcomes]

- (1) Participant and their organization identify current situation/challenges of rural women in the target area and formulate an Inception Report.
- (2) Participant understands the transition of Japan's policies and approaches for supporting rural women to improve their living environment and realize their economic independency, including Livelihood Improvement Approach, and extract lessons according to the situation of each country.
- (3) Participant understands the transition, present conditions and challenges of rural women's economic, social and environmental activities/support measures, and extract lessons according to the situation of each country.
- (4) Participant understands methods for supporting rural women and consider measures for improving situations in the target area.

 - (5) Gender and Development (concept of gender, gender mainstreaming, empowerment of women, gender analysis tools)

[2nd week] Government Policy for Supporting Rural Women in Japan, History of Japan in Supporting Rural Women and the Role of Extension Services, Livelihood Improvement Approach (LIA); concept, methods, workshop, Site-Visit related to LIA [3rd week] Gender Mainstreaming; concept, methods, workshop, Case Studies of Women Empowerment

[4th week] Study Trip to Nagano Prefecture (TBD); Visiting Women's Group, Local Government Office, JA - Japan Agricultural Cooperatives, Direct marketing shops etc. [5th week] Action Plan Preparation and Presentation, Discussion, Closing Ceremony

Eligibility and Procedures

1. Expectations to the Applying Organizations

- (1) This course is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Applying organizations are expected to use the program for those specific purposes.
- (2) In this connection, applying organizations are expected to nominate the most qualified candidates to address the said issues or problems, carefully referring to the qualifications described below.
- (3) Applying organizations are also expected to be prepared to make use of knowledge acquired by the nominees for the said purpose.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

[Remarks] Each Organizations is requested to strongly encourage female candidates to apply for the course to accelerate the realization of gender equality and women's empowerment.

(1) Essential Qualifications

1) Current Duties:

Government officer, extension officer or Subject Matter Specialist who is engaged in extension activities or gender-related activities for rural women, such as life improvement (home economics), agriculture, community development, and so on.

- 2) Experience in the relevant field: <u>over 3 (Three) years' experience</u> in the above-mentioned activities.
- 3) Educational Background: University graduate or equivalent.
- 4) Language: Proficient in spoken and written English.
- 5) Health: must be in good health to participate in the program in Japan. To reduce the risk of worsening symptoms associated with respiratory tract



infection, please be honest to declare in the Medical History (QUESTIONNAIRE ON MEDICAL STATUS RESTRICTION of the application form) if you have been a patient of following illnesses; Hypertension / Diabetes / Cardiovascular illness / Heart failure / Chronic respiratory illness.

(2) Recommended Qualifications

Age: be no more than 45 years old
 Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment: JICA seeks more female
 applicants due to the past records of fewer applications from women. JICA
 is committed to promoting gender equality and women's empowerment,
 and provides equal opportunities for all applicants regardless of their
 sexual orientation or gender identity.

3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) **Application Form:** The Application Form is available at the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan)
 - * If you have any difficulties/disabilities which require assistance, please specify necessary assistances in the QUESTIONNAIRE ON MEDICAL STATUS RESTRICTION (1-(c)) of the application form. Information will be reviewed and used for reasonable accommodation.
- (2) **Photocopy of Passport:** You should submit it with the application form if you possess your passport which you will carry when entering Japan for this program. If not, you are requested to submit its photocopy as soon as you obtain it.
 - *The following information should be included in the photocopy:

 Name, Date of Birth, Nationality, Sex, Passport Number and Expiry Date

 *It is recommended that your passport be valid for more than 6 months after the last day of the program.
- (3) **English Score Sheet:** to be submitted with the application form, if the nominees have any official English examination scores. (e.g., TOEFL, TOEIC, IELTS)



4. Procedures for Application and Selection

(1) Submission of the Application Documents

Closing date for applications: Please confirm the local deadline with the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan).

(All required material must arrive at JICA Center in Japan by August 18, 2025)

(2) Selection

Primary screening is conducted at the JICA overseas office (or the embassy of Japan) after receiving official documents from your government. JICA Center will consult with concerned organizations in Japan in the process of final selection. Applying organizations with the best intentions to utilize the opportunity will be highly valued.

The Government of Japan will examine applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military, taking into consideration of their duties, positions in the organization and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner to be consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan.

(3) Notice of Acceptance

The JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan) will notify the results <u>not</u> <u>later than September 22, 2025.</u>

5. Conditions for Participation

The participants of KCCP are required

- (1) to strictly observe the course schedule,
- (2) not to change the air ticket (and flight class and flight schedule arranged by JICA) and lodging by the participants themselves,
- (3) to understand that leaving Japan during the course period (to return to home country, etc.) is not allowed (except for programs longer than one year),
- (4) not to bring or invite any family members (except for programs longer than one year),



- (5) to carry out such instructions and abide by such conditions as may be stipulated by both the nominating Government and the Japanese Government in respect of the course,
- (6) to observe the rules and regulations of the program implementing partners to provide the program or establishments,
- (7) not to engage in political activities, or any form of employment for profit,
- (8) to discontinue the program, should the participants violate the Japanese laws or JICA's regulations, or the participants commit illegal or immoral conduct, or get critical illness or serious injury and be considered unable to continue the course. The participants shall be responsible for paying any cost for treatment of the said health conditions except for the medical care stipulated in (3) of "3.Expenses", "Administrative Arrangements",
- (9) to return the total amount or a part of the expenditure for the KCCP depending on the severity of such violation, should the participants violate the laws and ordinances,
- (10) not to drive a car or motorbike, regardless of an international driving license possessed,
- (11) to observe the rules and regulations at the place of the participants' accommodation, and
- (12) to refund allowances or other benefits paid by JICA in the case of a change in schedule.

- (1) **Air Ticket:** In principle, JICA will arrange an economy-class roud-trip ticket between an international airport designated by JICA and Japan.

JICA and Capacity Development

Technical cooperation is people-to-people cooperation that supports partner countries in enhancing their comprehensive capacities to address development challenges by their own efforts. Instead of applying Japanese technology per se to partner countries, JICA's technical cooperation provides solutions that best fit their needs by working with people living there. In the process, consideration is given to factors such as their regional characteristics, historical background, and languages. JICA does not limit its technical cooperation to human resources development; it offers multi-tiered assistance that also involves organizational strengthening, policy formulation, and institution building.

Implementation methods of JICA's technical cooperation can be divided into two approaches. One is overseas cooperation by dispatching experts and volunteers in various development sectors to partner countries; the other is domestic cooperation by inviting participants from developing countries to Japan. The latter method is the Knowledge Co-Creation Program, formerly called Training Program, and it is one of the core programs carried out in Japan. By inviting officials from partner countries and with cooperation from domestic partners, the Knowledge Co-Creation Program provides technical knowledge and practical solutions for development issues in participating countries.

The Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) has long occupied an important place in JICA operations. About 400 pre-organized course cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs is being customized by the different target organizations to address the specific needs, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan, as the first non-Western nation to become a developed country, built itself into a country that is free, peaceful, prosperous and democratic while preserving its tradition. Japan will serve as one of the best examples for our partner countries to follow in their own development.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from a process of adoption and adaptation, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories.

Through Japan's progressive adaptation and application of systems, methods and technologies from the West in a way that is suited to its own circumstances, Japan has developed a storehouse of knowledge not found elsewhere from unique systems of organization, administration and personnel management to such social systems as the livelihood improvement approach and governmental organization. It is not easy to apply such experiences to other countries where the circumstances differ, but the experiences can provide ideas and clues useful when devising measures to solve problems.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
